

Forty-five minutes before the raid, Schreiber and Rucks flew over the camp and began their convincing performance of a severely crippled plane on the verge of a crash. The guards were caught by surprise as they watched the P-61 circle above with the engines sputtering and backfiring loudly. This effect was by Schreiber's skill caused of manipulating the ignition to cut the power to the engines and then restart them. They waggled their wings and then scraped over the nearby tree-covered ridgeline with only 30 feet of clearance, only to reappear again to take another pass. Finally, they disappeared over the horizon with the Japanese transfixed, waiting for the sound of an explosion.

Kenneth Schreiber's Wild Distraction Raid on the Philippine POW camp Cabanatuan

On the night of January 30th, 1945, a lone P-61 Black Widow flew over the Cabanatuan POW camp in the Philippines. Its sole mission was to put on an air show that would capture the attention of the Japanese guards below.

The plane "Hard To Get" was piloted by Captain Kenneth Schreiber and radar specialist 1st Lieutenant Bonnie Rucks, from the 547th Night Fighter Squadron. They had received an unusual request to fly over the prison camp and distract the guards long enough for the combined forces of United States Army Rangers, Alamo Scouts, and Filipino guerillas to creep across open terrain surrounding the camp and rescue the 500 allied POWs held captive there.

The spectacle caused the Japanese to be completely unaware of the planned raid on Cabanatuan, allowing it to be a massive success for the Allied forces.

Kenneth Schreiber was from Rainier, graduating from Rainier High school in 1937. He had a sister Dorothy, who graduated in 1942 and married Bob Bernard that year on September 3 in the Hudson Community Church. Their parents were Joseph and Hilda Schreiber, and they had lived on the property that is now owned by the John Stennick family (at the end of Oliva Dr. off of Wonderly Road). Chris Smith grew up next door to them and remembered, "In my early teens I worked for them in their orchard, mowing yard and anything a teenage boy could do. In my late teens and early 20's, I cut their firewood and filled the basement of the house with it for winter. Joe taught me a lot about the logging history of the area. He showed me where the steam donkey sat that lowered the rail cars loaded with logs from the Hudson and surrounding areas." (1).

It was Duane Bernard's uncle Bob who married Dorothy, and he remembers attending their wedding. Duane commented, "I worked side by side with Joe in the early and mid '50s at the cheese plant in Rainier. Rainier Creamery, later on Standard Dairy, also sold bottled milk and ice cream. Plus, they owned the lockers there, but that's another story. Joe and I, and a few others from the Creamery, used to deer hunt together in the, then recent, Tillamook Burn. I bought a gun from Joe that I still have, and I treasure it. Probably the most interesting thing that I remember about Joe is the fact that he related to me that he helped to build the old original Columbia River Highway out east of Rainier. He said he drove a horse-pulling a fresno. A fresno was a small scraper used to scrape up and then haul dirt or rock. It had to be dumped manually. I often wonder if he had a hand in building the portion of that road by Little Jack Falls where ROHM is involved currently. All he ever told me was 'out east of town.' Joe's father-in-law was Johnny Johnson who owned the property prior to Joe and Hilda. Johnny Johnson created the 'Johnson Fir.' Joe donated one to the city, and it was planted in front of and to the east of Rainier City Hall. I remember a conversation Carl Nys and I had about the Johnson Fir," Duane commented.

Kenneth continued his military service after World War II serving in Korea and Vietnam and rose to the rank of Lt Col in the US Air Force. He passed away in 1994.

We continue to work tirelessly to raise funds to build our new museum. We have applied for four grants in the last two months. We received \$5,000 from the Autzen Foundation, and we will be receiving word by the end of October if we are accepted to complete an application for the Marie Lamfrom grant for \$50,000. We have just begun the process of applying for the M. J.Murdock Charitable Trust grant. Grant applications are a difficult and time-consuming process, but we will continue to apply for grants until we have the funds needed to build our museum.

THERE IS STILL HOPE! We continue to advocate for the funding of the remaining 14 capital projects that include funding for building a new museum for Rainier, and the HB 2459 recovery bill that will be addressed again in a special 2024 winter session in January and February.

Please contact Oregon State Representative Rob Nosse and our Oregon State Senators and Representatives to let them know how important funding the remaining 14 CREF slate of projects is to the cultural and arts health of Oregon.

We continue to transfer our collection of photos, documents and donated items into archival storage after receiving an archival grant last year. We have also begun the long process of entering each donated item in our collection into our Past Perfect program which will allow us to find any item in our collection by entering a related word. When completed, each item will have a description and a picture showing the donated item. It will be a great tool that can be used to find a specific item for a visitor who is looking for a family photo, history or a certain item.

The mission of our museum is to educate our community, including our local students, about the history of Rainier. On October 20, our museum will be hosting three, second grade classes and showing them objects that they may never have seen before or know what the object was used for. We have hosted grade school classes in years past and the children always enjoy their hands-on learning experience about historical items. We hope that this experience will increase their curiosity about Rainier's history and the items that we have in our collection. One class we had in the past had never seen a rotary dial telephone before or knew how it worked.

Please stop by the museum for a visit on any Saturday between noon and four. We look forward to seeing you!

Plaques By Martha Van Natta, ROHM Treasurer

You can view three different plaques at the museum: the Building Fund Plaque, the Memorial Plaque, and our new Life Member Plaque.

The Memorial Plaque is to honor loved ones who have passed. You can put your relative's, or friend's name, on this plaque for a donation of \$500 to the museum. These funds are dedicated to the museum's building fund. In order to place a name on this plaque, we would need the person's name and their birth and death years. Families can request donations be made to the museum building fund in lieu of flowers as a choice of a charity to remember a deceased friend or loved one.

You can put your own name on the Building Fund Plaque by donating \$500 to the building fund. You can also put the name of a deceased person on the building fund by donating \$500 in their memory. You can donate any amount. When the museum accumulates \$500 in a person's name, we will put their name on the plaque. Several families, and their friends, have gotten together to donate in the memory of their loved ones.

We have a new plaque, the Life Member Plaque. If you'd like to be a life member of the museum, all you have to do is purchase a life membership for \$500. You can pay for it all at once, or you can make a pledge with the museum and pay \$100 a month. You can skip months as long as we receive the \$500 within a year's time. If you decide not to do this, any money you have already paid would be credited for future years. For instance, if you have paid \$100, then you would be credited four years of membership.

It costs \$500 to put a name on each plaque. All plaques are displayed at the museum. You can view them on Saturdays between noon and four o'clock, although a plaque could be at the engravers getting more names put on it.




Veterans Day Celebration November 11, 2023

Soley's Pharmacy 1948-1966 Verner (Verne) and Henrietta Soley

Verner M. Soley graduated from Washington State College in 1929 and served in the Navy during WWII for three years as a chief pharmacist mate. He spent eight years in Juneau, Alaska, where he met and married his wife Henrietta Curtis. Verner and his wife moved to Rainier in 1948 and opened their pharmacy on November 13, 1948 in the Hirtzel building that was located on the north side of East B Street (Hwy 30) between East 1st St. and East 2nd St. Mrs. Soley's parents Arnold and Alice Curtis had also moved earlier that same year from Alaska and settled in nearby Prescott, Oregon. Sometime prior to May 1962 Soley moved his pharmacy to the south side East B Street into a larger store (located at 110 E B St). His first store later became the Chuck Wagon Cafe. This

building was later torn down and at present is a vacant lot. Mr. Soley was involved in several civic activities and belonged to several organizations. Soley closed his Pharmacy on October 31, 1966. Verner passed away in 1976 and Henrietta in 1993.





Dr. William Edward Welch

Dr. William E. Welch came to Rainier in 1907 to practice medicine. He was Rainier's mayor from April 3, 1911, to March 5, 1912, and for several years at a later time he served on the Rainier water board.

Dr. Welch was recognized by leading physicians of Portland as one of the most efficient men in his profession. During his prime years he was frequently called into consultation with Portland surgeons and physicians before serious and important operations were performed.

Dr. Welch was stricken with two paralytic strokes in On June 28th, that same year, a March 1924. devastating fire severely damaged his office that was on the second floor of the State Bank of Rainier building. He had no insurance. The fire also destroyed most of Rainier's businesses on the northside of "A" street. It was decided later to remove the upper floor of the bank building and to keep it as a single story. This building still exists at present. He died in Portland at age 66 at the home of his sister in Portland on December 3, 1927.
